Please do not re-register as a member. Send an email to gain@printing.org with your full name, company name. We will notify you by email within two business days when your GAIN registration has been corrected.

If you have never registered on GAIN:

- On the front page, click on Register Now. Create a username and password for yourself following the guidelines on the page. You create your own username and password. Check GATF/PIA member and using the pull down menu indicate how you would like to verify your membership. Select Affiliate. Hit enter.
- If your username or password has already been selected or if there is an error in their information, i.e., not enough characters, you will be brought back to this screen and there will be a message at the TOP of the screen.

Q We've seen important improvements to the screen printing process in the last few years. Do you see this trend continuing? Can you give us an idea of where you think its heading?

A There is no question that screen printing has had, and must continue to have, improvements in the processing. The question is whether the support products will be there for the emerging technology that is necessary to sustain the contributions to progressive processing improvements.

For the immediate future, the direction will be focused on fine-tuning existing process improvements like computer-to-screen output speed, resolution, and increasing format size. Generally, improving pre- and post-screen processes will no doubt have a high priority for contributions in the throughput improvements of daily production.

Q What is the biggest challenge that screen printing companies face today? How can they work to meet this challenge?

A For the immediate future the first and foremost challenge for screen printing companies is to maintain its market share. With all print media competing for business, and digital application becoming more of a player, screen printing must become more efficient. Efficiencies will eventually lead to delivering the economics for effectively competing in the print media market.

Q What important changes have you seen recently in the marketplace? Why do you feel they are important?

A The significant change in the market place has been the growth of digital printing and the net effect it has on the present and future growth of the screen printing market. What is so dramatic is the reduction of single colour screen printing machine purchases over the last several years. This alarming fact illustrates the impact that digital printing has and will continue to have on screen printing. Adversely, the tremendous increase of multicolour inline screen machines over the same time period indicates a movement to fully automated print operations along with enlarged format capacity.

Q What is your prediction for the future of imaging, taking into account both market and technology factors? What will we see in ten years?

A Let's use digital printing, one of our important capabilities, as an example. We see that the technology is improving each day - it is faster, and the quality is going to be much better in the future. On the other hand, we feel digital printing will become too widespread, with too many competitors, so we cannot see a future where a company that only does digital printing will be successful. We see digital printing as an important complementary service to a company's other capabilities.

Font usage and the Printing Industry

The fair and legal use of fonts has often been a grey area in the printing industry. As typeface users it is not difficult to be on the wrong side of the law. If you use font software for which you don't have a licence, supply a font to another user, or even use a font on more computers than the licence agreement allows, you are probably breaking the software licence agreement or copyright law.

Type 1 Software

Type 1 is the name of the worldwide standard for digital font software. It was first developed by Adobe Systems, a leader in the design and manufacture of Type 1 software. Adobe also maintains the standards for Type 1.

TrueType

TrueType was developed by Microsoft and Apple for use in their proprietary operating environments.

OpenType

OpenType is a new cross-platform font file format developed by Adobe and Microsoft. It is an extension of the TrueType .SNFT format that can now support PostScript® font data and new typographic features.

History of typeface licensing

In the early days of electronic fonts, major type foundries licensed fonts by printer (anyone who shared a printer in an office environment would be allowed to share the font files as well.) These early fonts were bitmapped for screen usage and the outline font was only used in PostScript language printers.

When outline fonts became usable on computers and non PostScript printers the major type foundries began rethinking their licence policy.

Today font software is licenced for use on computer rather than by printer in much the same way as other application software licensing.

Licence Structure

Most fonts are now obtainable with a 5-CPU licence for use within one company. It does not entitle the licence holder to use the font on another CPU not belonging to his company.

Transporting Typefaces

Customers are allowed to give their font files to a service bureau with a print job **if and only if** the service bureau already possesses a valid licence for the font software. (This allowed latitude is to ensure that the customer's version of the font software is the one used to image the print job). A customer is not allowed to supply a font to a bureau who does not have a valid font licence. This would also apply to a bureau or agency supplying a font to a printer.

Embedding Typefaces

Some typeface manufacturers allow certain fonts to be embedded into documents for the purposes of viewing and printing only. A valid licence for an embedded font is required for any computer editing a document containing that font. In other words fonts are licenced to the computer doing the editing. Editing is perceived as a value add service and a valid licence is required.

In general it is legal to embed fonts in documents that cannot be edited nor the fonts accessed

for use in other documents. Printing to a PostScript language file or embedding fonts into formats like PDF files are usually legal. Sending fonts on floppies or electronically along with print jobs are not legal, (unless the receiver has a valid licence) as the fonts can be installed and used as fonts in other documents.

Fonts created by Adobe, Linotype, ITC, Monotype and Agfa may be embedded in a document for viewing and printing purposes. Other companies should be contacted directly to ascertain their licence agreements and embedding privileges.

Font manipulation

Customers can use font manipulation software to produce derivatives of Adobe licensed fonts as long as this is done in accordance with the licensing terms that are stated on the packaging for the original Type 1 products purchased by the user. However derivative fonts are definitely protected under copyright law and the font manufacturers will pursue their property rights vigorously.

Typeface management strategy

- ◆ Establish a corporate policy to use legal software only.
- ◆ Appoint a designated person to assist in controlling use of software and to point out any illegal usage.
- ◆ Conduct an initial and follow up audits.
- ◆ Ensure that no software is copied or redistributed within your company in contravention of software licence agreements.
- ◆ Use multi-users licences for use on more than one computer and multi-site licences for use in several locations or offices of your company.
- ◆ Only a single copy of a font is allowed to be made for back up purposes.
- ◆ All illegal fonts should be removed from your computer stations and networks.
- ◆ Ensure that your service bureaux or clients have legal copies of fonts embedded in Postscript files or PDFs .
- ◆ Download fonts from legitimate type foundries, designers and distributors.
- ◆ Do not edit documents with embedded fonts unless you own a valid licence for the fonts involved.

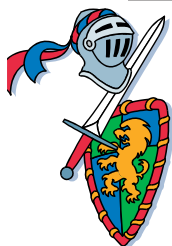

Eleventh Amendment of the South African Passports and Travel Documents Regulations. Fees

- ♦ 16(1) Subject to subregulation (2) and (3) the fees payable in respect of a South African passport or a travel document issued under these regulations, shall be as follows.
 - a) South African Passport 32pp R 145.00 and 64pp R 290.00. If new format and runs out of blank visa pages R 115.00
 - b) child Passport R 110.00
 - c) Document for Travel purposes R 110.00
 - d) Emergency passport R 50.00
 - e) Temporary passport R 70.00
- ♦ 16(2) No fees shall be payable in respect of an official passport, a crew member certificate, an emergency passport or temporary passport issued to a person referred to in regula-

tion 2(3) or for the renewal of a passport referred to regulation 17(3)

- ♦ 16(3) The fees payable in respect of the replacement of a lost, stolen or damaged South African passport, child passport, document for travel purposes or temporary passport referred to in subregulation 1 and a passport referred to in regulation 17(3) shall be twice the amount prescribed in that subregulation: Provided that in instances where the document referred to was lost, stolen or damaged through no negligence on the part of the holder, only the normal fee shall be payable.

Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act 130/1993

Circular Instruction 180 regarding the compensation of Work-Related Upper Limb Disorders (WRULD's)

This instruction supersedes all previous instructions. The Compensation Commissioner's "Guidelines for medical practitioners and employers on how to manage Work-Related Upper Limb Disorders (WRULDs) " can also be used for further reference.

Definition

WRULDs is a collective term for a group of occupational diseases that consist of musculo-skeletal disorders caused by exposure in the workplace affecting the muscles, tendons, nerves, blood vessels, joints and bursae of the hand, wrist, arm and shoulder. These syndromes associated with characteristic symptoms and

physical signs (eg rotator cuff syndrome, epicondylitis at the elbow, tenosynovitis and nerve entrapments such as carpal tunnel syndrome.

Previously other terms had been used, such as repetitive strain injury (RSI), cumulative trauma disorder (CTD), occupational overuse syndrome (OOS), occupational cervico-brachial disorder (OCD), etc. For the purpose of this instruction the umbrella term, work-related upper limb disorders (WRULDs), will be used.

WRULDs are caused, aggravated or precipitated by one or more of the following:

- ♦ Highly repetitive movements
- ♦ Movements requiring force
- ♦ Movements at the extremes of reach
- ♦ Static muscle loading
- ♦ Awkward sustained postures
- ♦ Contact stress (uncomfortable gripping and twisting, sharp edges to hand tools, desk edges

♦ Vibration

In terms of this instruction, upper limb musculo-skeletal disorders will be presumed to be work related if the nature of the work performed includes exposure to the relevant risk factors.

Circular Instruction 181 regarding compensation for occupational contact dermatitis.

This instruction is issued to clarify the position with regard to compensation of claims for occupational contact dermatitis and supersedes all previous instructions regarding compensation for occupational contact dermatitis.

Definition

Occupational contact dermatitis is a clinically recognisable condition of the skin caused entirely or aggravated by conditions in the workplace. Two types of contact dermatitis are generally recognisable; irritant contact dermatitis and allergic contact dermatitis.
